I am a student from China, and I learnt a lot after reading your article <A Brief History of American Higher Education>. Regarding the topic of education in America, I want to share some of my opinions with you.

When I studied in my country, we had long been told that America has the most successful education system. I think it is true that because in most ranking lists of the world-wide best universities, usually two third of them comes from America. And also, America has the most number of winners of Nobel Prize, which can prove the successes of education. However, there are many people keep questioning that the elementary and secondary education of America is not as good as the performance of higher education. I've seen a documentary film recently contends that there are serious problems existing in America's elementary and secondary education. Many students can't improve their study ability in school, especially after they enter into middle school. Student's ability of reading and mathematics are much worse than Indian and Chinese students.
